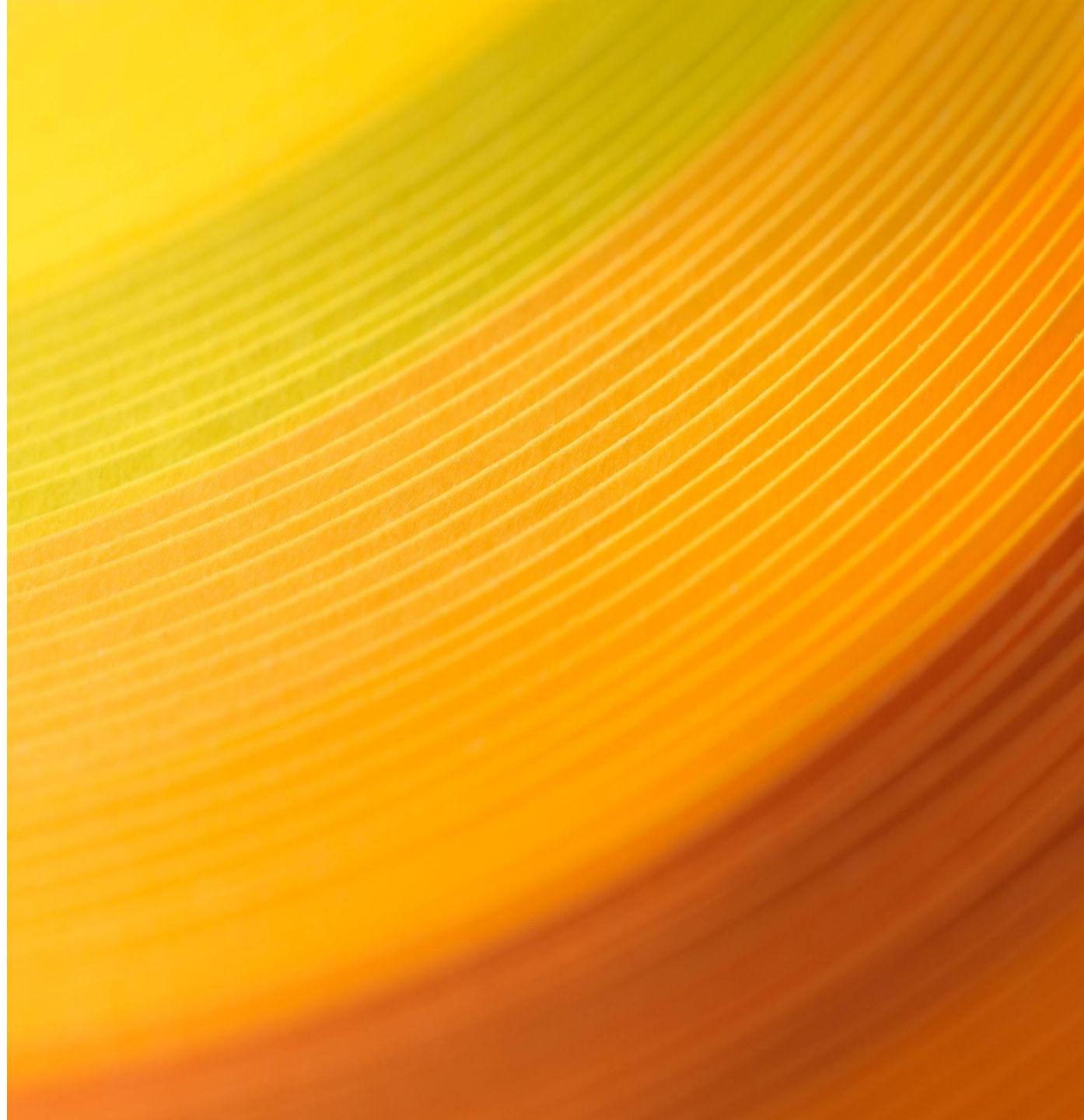

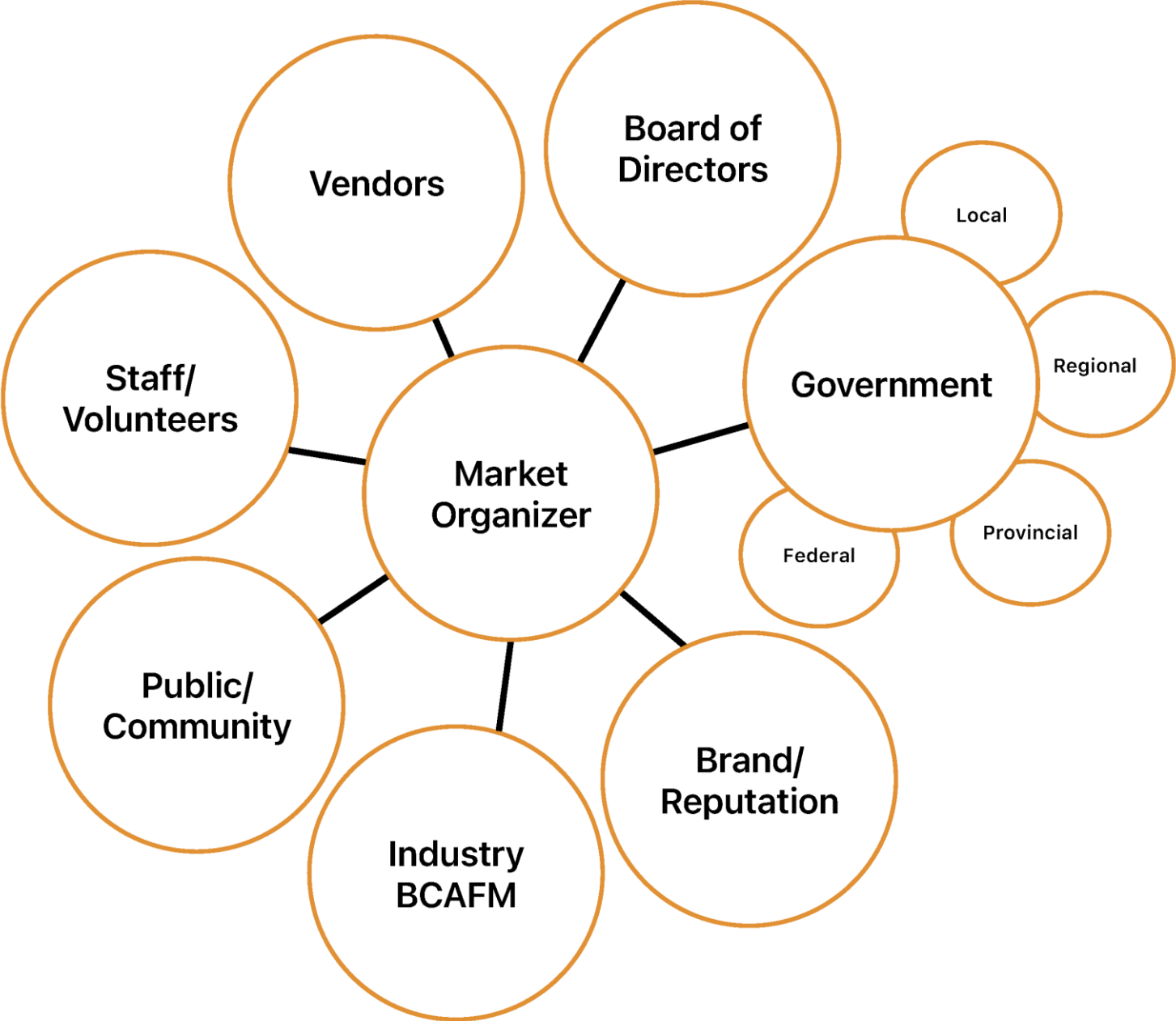

Our Role & Responsibilities as the Market Organizer of a BC Farmers' Market

What is my job?

Responsibilities →



Vendors

Recruitment: Vendor outreach, waitlists, category balancing, identifying new farms and producers, supporting early-stage growers.

Applications: Intake, eligibility verification, producer/make/bake/grow rules, product review, seasonal approval.

Compliance: Food safety documentation, liability insurance, permits, labeling rules, inspection records.

Category Control: Maintaining farm/food/artisan balance, avoiding duplication, protecting core agriculture, managing category caps.

Vendor Relations: Conflict resolution, fairness enforcement, communication, complaints and dispute management.

Stall Allocation: Mapping, spacing, accessibility, power needs, logistics and placement planning.

Payments: Stall fees, invoicing, collections, arrears tracking, payment management.

Attendance: Weekly tracking, seasonal commitments, vendor reliability.

Product Approval: Ensuring only approved products are sold, preventing scope drift.

Enforcement: Violations, warnings, suspensions, removals, rule enforcement.

Documentation: Vendor database, permits, certifications, insurance tracking.

Risk Management: High-risk food review, recall response, safety verification.

Vendor Success: Supporting sales, promotion, marketing inclusion, education.

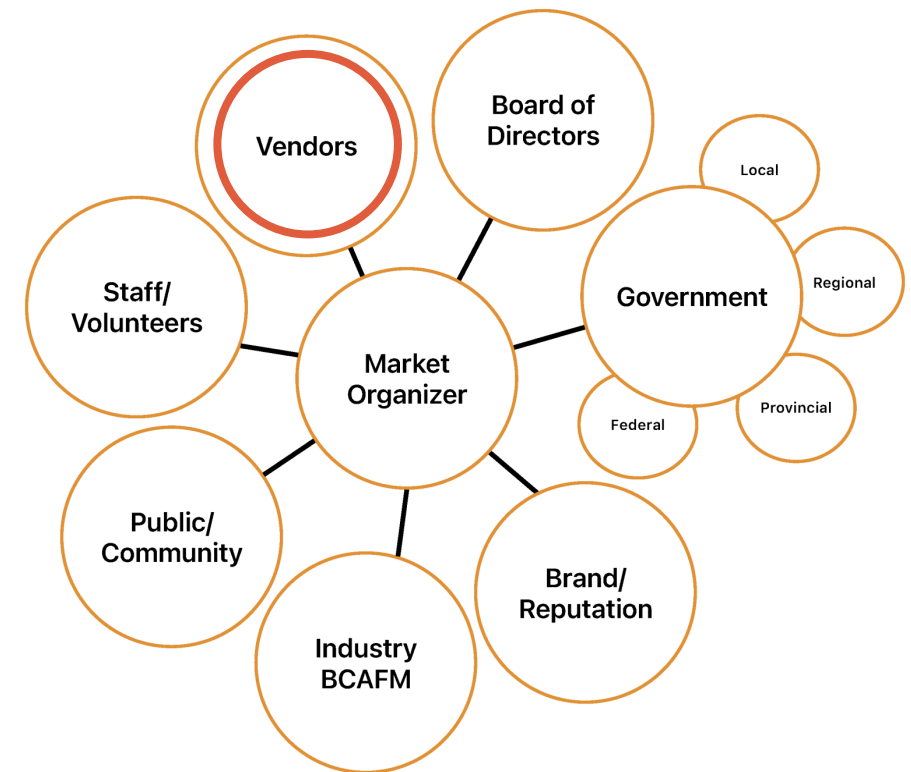
Education: Food safety, labeling, sampling, pricing, display standards.

Equity: Supporting small farms, culturally diverse vendors, reducing barriers.

Programs: Nutrition coupons, tokens, grants, vendor participation.

Communication: Weekly updates, operational notices, policy changes.

Market Day Operations: Check-in, placement, real-time issue resolution.



Board of Directors

Governance: Bylaws, Society Act compliance, governance structure and policy.

Reporting: Financial, operational, strategic, and risk reporting.

Strategy: Long-term planning, site decisions, growth, capital projects.

Risk Oversight: Liability, insurance, crisis governance.

Financial Oversight: Budgets, reserves, deficits, audits.

Executive Oversight: Hiring, supervision, evaluation of ED/Manager.

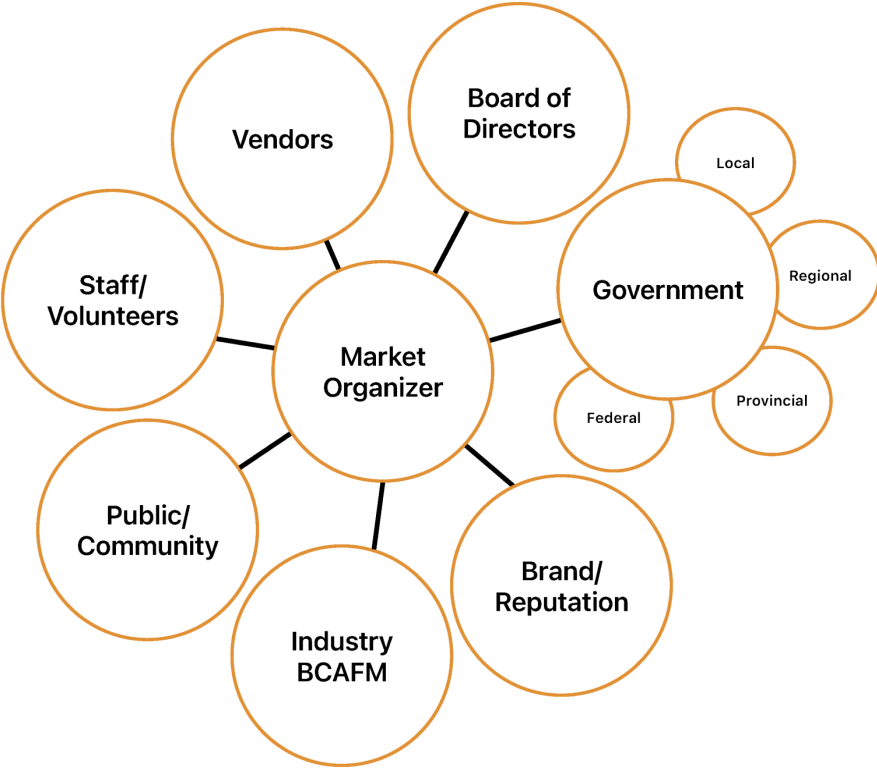
Legal Compliance: Contracts, governance standards, fiduciary duty.

Decision Support: Briefings, policy framing, motion preparation.

Alignment: Ensuring governance reflects operational reality.

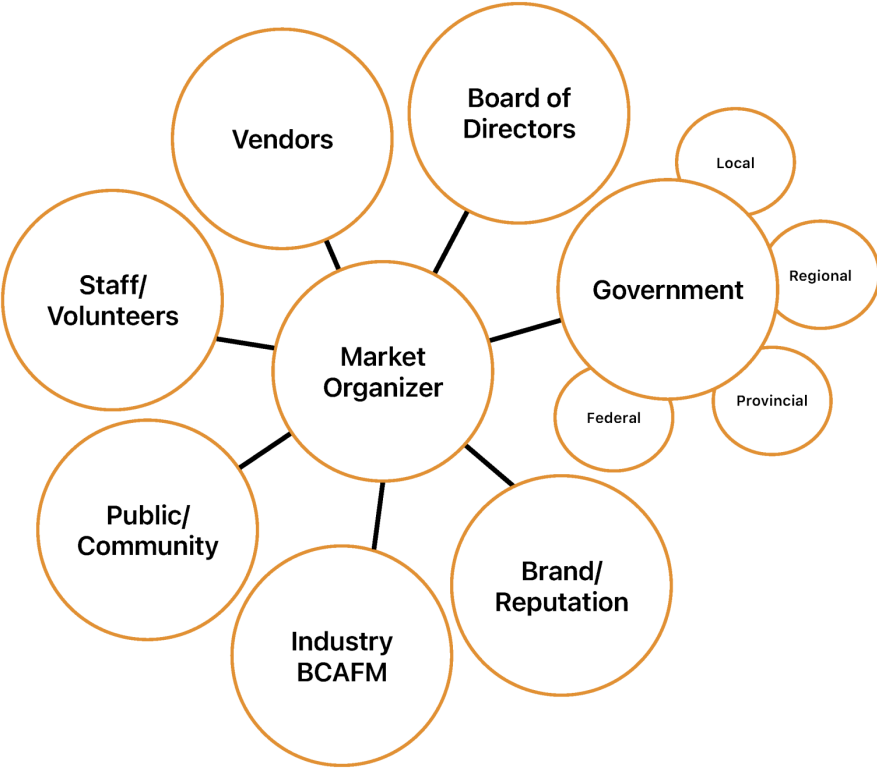
Continuity: Institutional knowledge and succession.

Board Dynamics: Managing governance health, conflict, and personalities.



Staff / Volunteers

- Hiring: Recruitment, onboarding, role definition.
- Training: Procedures, safety, vendor relations, compliance.
- Scheduling: Coverage planning, contingency management.
- Payroll / Admin: Hours tracking, documentation, compliance.
- Safety: Incident reporting, emergency response readiness.
- Supervision: Coaching, performance, discipline.
- Role Clarity: Clear workflow and responsibilities.
- Retention: Burnout prevention, morale support.
- Volunteers: Recruitment, coordination, appreciation.
- Culture: Maintaining professional, calm, reliable operations.



Public / Community

Customer Experience: Flow, amenities, signage, welcoming environment.

Accessibility: Inclusive design, mobility access.

Safety: Crowd management, emergency readiness.

Complaints: Handling public concerns and disputes.

Education: Food literacy, agriculture awareness.

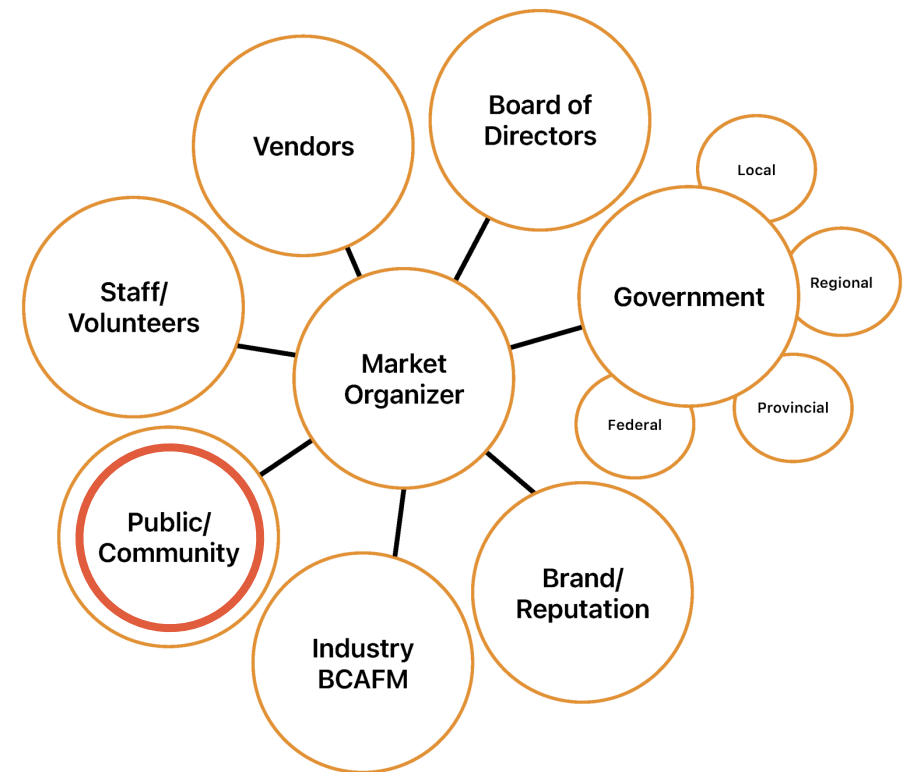
Community Role: Social space, local connection, cohesion.

Events: Programming, music, special activities.

Inclusion: Low-income access, nutrition programs.

Communication: Website, social media, public messaging.

Public Trust: Maintaining a safe, fair, trusted marketplace.



Industry (BCAFM / Farmers' Market Sector)

Standards: Member farmers' market requirements.

Reporting: Surveys, economic data, metrics.

Programs: Nutrition programs, sector initiatives.

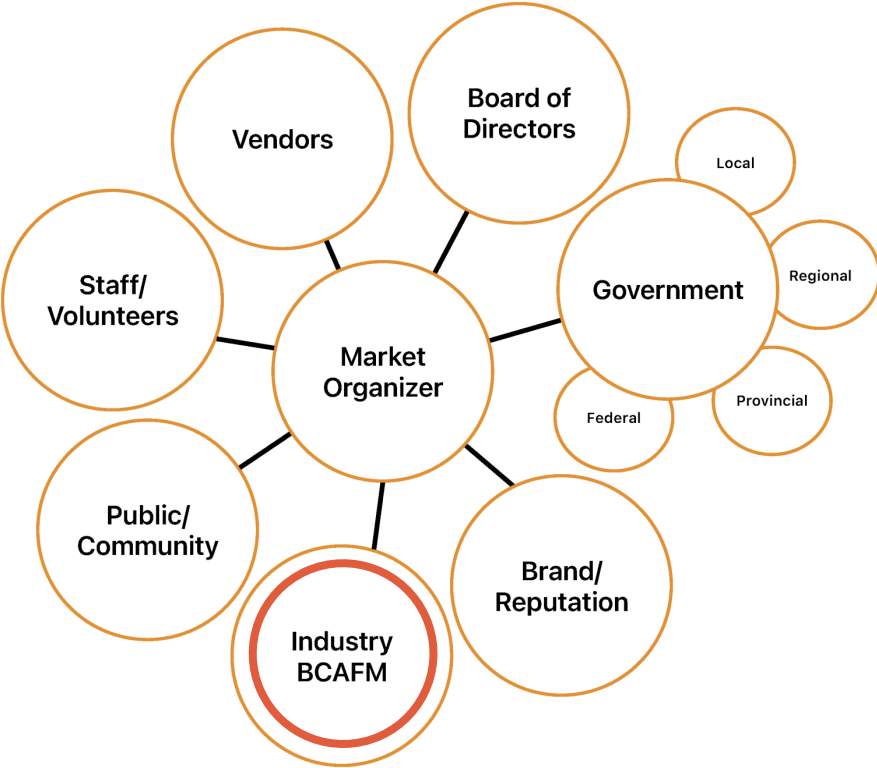
Collaboration: Knowledge sharing across markets.

Advocacy: Supporting sector funding and protection.

Integrity: Maintaining producer-only authenticity.

Representation: Participation in provincial discussions.

Alignment: Meeting evolving industry expectations.



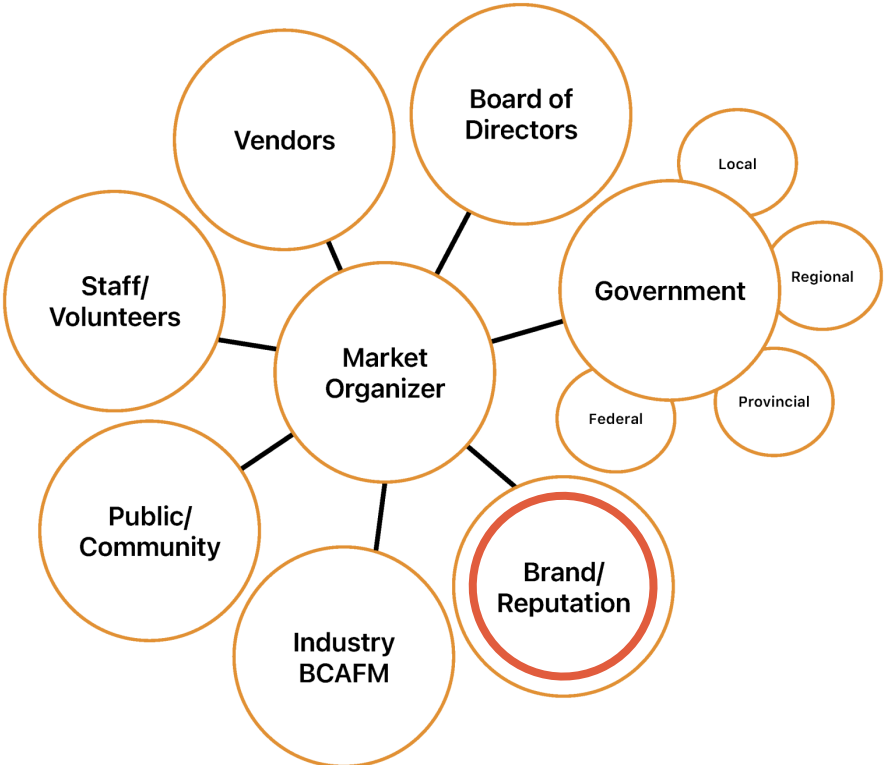
Brand / Reputation

Identity: Define what the market is (farm-focused, mixed, rural, urban, community hub) and ensure vendors, policies, and experience reflect that identity.

Personality & Voice: Maintain consistent tone aligned with community (Cedar: rural, neighbourly, plainspoken, never snobby; Duncan: polished, professional, steady).

Trust & Integrity: Protect public trust through consistent enforcement, transparent decisions, and framing safety as community care.

Reputation, Promotion & Public Presence: Advertising strategy, marketing choices, messaging, social media voice, media relations, storytelling, crisis communication, and protecting long-term credibility and recognizable market character.



Government (All Jurisdictions)

Federal: CFIA food labeling, Consumer Packaging & Labelling Act, Weights & Measures, national recalls, Health Canada cosmetics, Natural Health Product boundary, Cannabis Act, copyright/music licensing (SOCAN/Re:Sound), CRA taxation, Competition Act, federal product safety, privacy baseline.

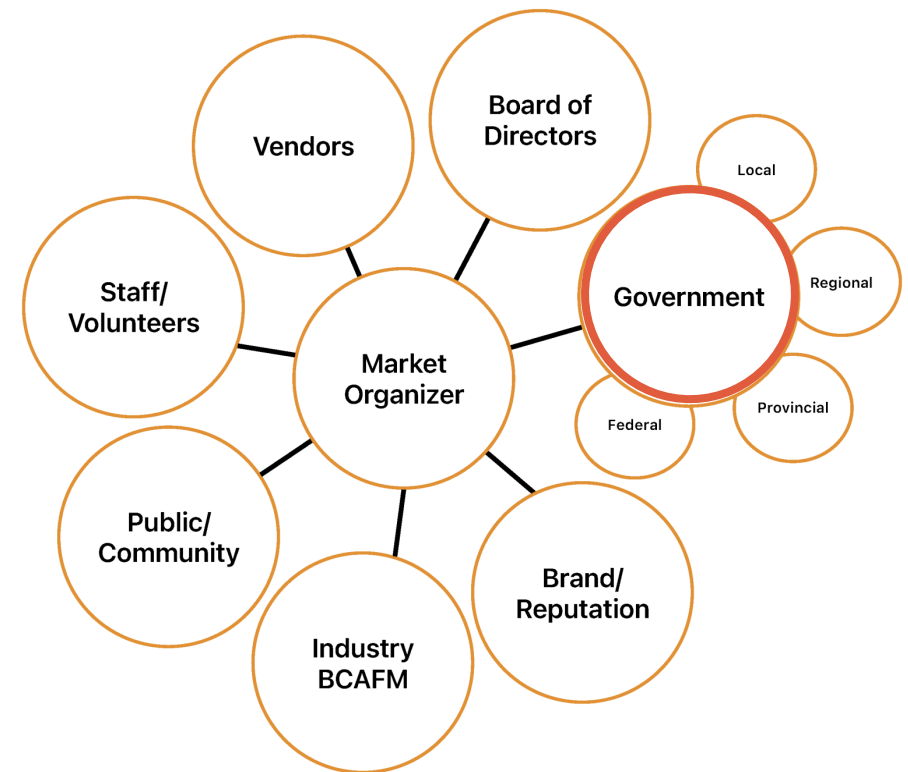
Provincial (BC): Health Authority food safety permits and inspections, meat inspection system, liquor permits, cannabis restrictions, public health orders, Employment Standards Act, WorkSafeBC, Consumer Protection BC, agriculture framework, emergency management.

Regional District: Zoning, land use, ALR interactions, environmental health coordination, sanitation, infrastructure, emergency planning.

Municipal / Local: Site permissions, lease requirements, bylaws (noise, traffic, signage), business licensing, policing, sanitation, event regulation, parking, public safety.

Insurance: Commercial general liability for market operations; additional insured requirements from municipality/landowner; Directors & Officers liability; staff/employer liability; volunteer coverage; event liability; property/content insurance for market assets; certificate management and renewals; ensuring coverage meets lease, grant, and regulatory requirements; incident reporting and claims management.

Regulatory Bodies: Health Authority, WorkSafeBC, SOCAN, Re:Sound, CRA, Consumer Protection BC, emergency services, insurance-driven compliance expectations.

Automate Market Donations

1. Setup or login to your free Square store.
2. Payments & Invoices -> Square Payment Links
3. If item is new -> Create link -> Sell an item or Accept a donation
If donation is an existing item -> Select -> Copy link



Get your donation link

Go to write > Add a record > URL > Paste your link!



NFC Top 6 at market

1. **Tap-to-Learn (Vendor List or Google Review pop-up)**
2. **Tap-to-Buy / Tap-to-Give Network** NFC at donations, musician tips, membership, sponsorship.
3. **Smart Compliance Logging** Hidden taps at first aid, fire, food safety, incident station.
Tap → quick form → auto-records incident, injury, compliance, risk.
4. **Tap-to-Learn (Market Intelligence)** Taps collect behaviour data: travel mode, first-time visits, demand, bike counts.
Survey question pops up for customers as they leave. New question each week.
5. **Vendor Digital Layer (Tap the Booth)**
Tap vendor → story, products, pre-order, follow, ingredients/allergens.
6. **Tap-to-Check-In (Vendors + Staff)** Replaces clipboards, timesheets, attendance.
Vendor taps → auto-logs arrival + stall. Or sales records at end of day.
Staff taps → start/stop shift → feeds payroll.



NFC Tags Fun List

1. **Kids Treasure Hunt:** Hidden animal taps → clues → finish = sticker / prize.
2. **Chicken Tap** 🐔: Tap → clucking sound + quick farm fact.
3. **Kids Market Passport:** Tap stations collect stamps (bee, tractor, apple) → complete = prize.
4. **Silly Farm Joke Button:** Tap → random farm joke (kids repeat endlessly).
5. **Tap the Music** 🎵: Shows song + tip the musician link.
6. **Giant Pumpkin Game** 🎃: Tap → guess the weight → winner next week.
7. **Compost Helper** 🌱: Tap → what goes in / funny mistakes.
8. **Welcome Tap:** “Today at the Market” (music, food, feature).

What is it?

Vertical AI refers to AI agents or systems that are purpose-built for a **specific domain or industry**.

Why?

Because the regulatory expectations on market managers, especially in food safety, are a top 3 challenge for BC farmers' market organizers.

How?

Use ChatGPT Plus or Poe.com (free, limited)

The Backend

Type: Prompt, Image Generation, Video Generation, Roleplay, Canvas, or Script.

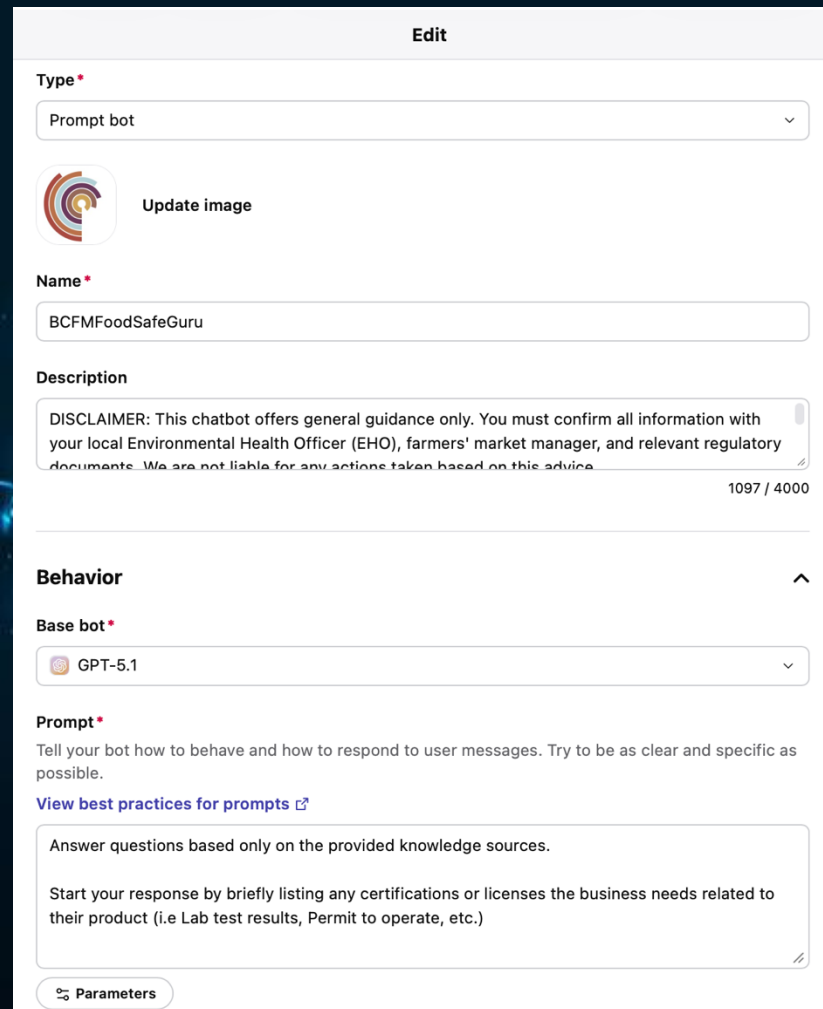
Customize thumbnail image and bot name.

Description: Does not impact bot behaviour. This can be for you (if private bot), or for the public user.

Prompt: This directs the bot's behaviour and action. This should be where you spend the most time in testing and editing.

Knowledge Base: This is where you can upload learning files.

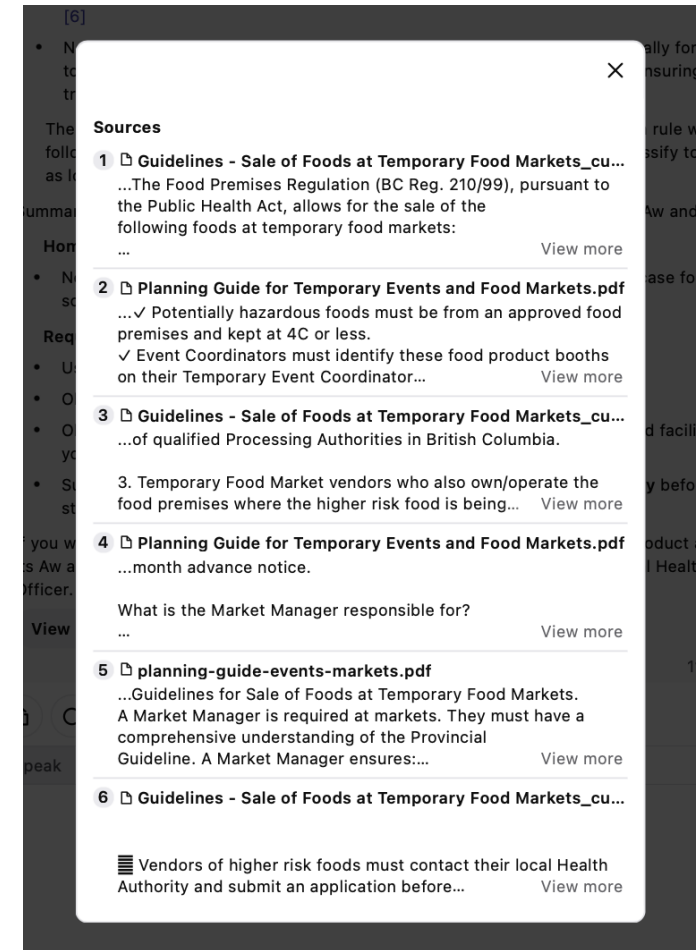
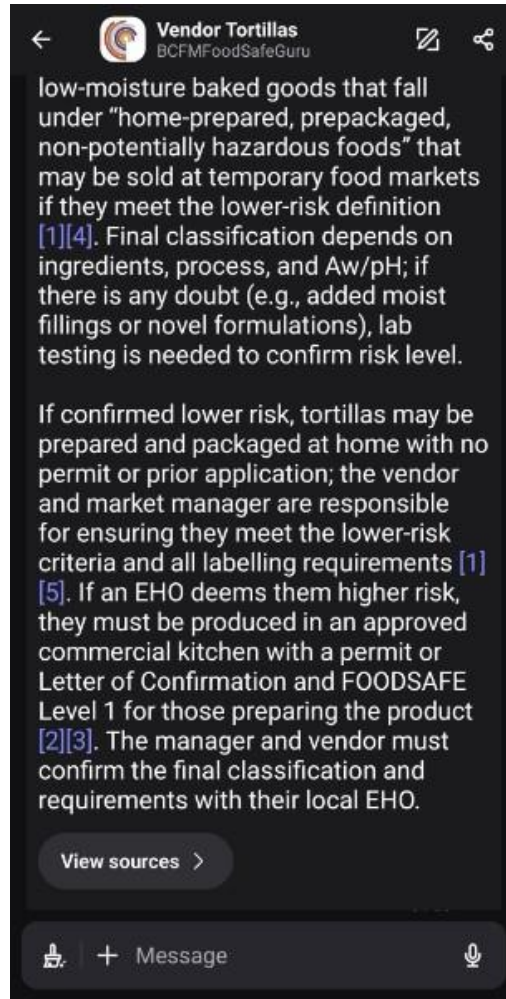
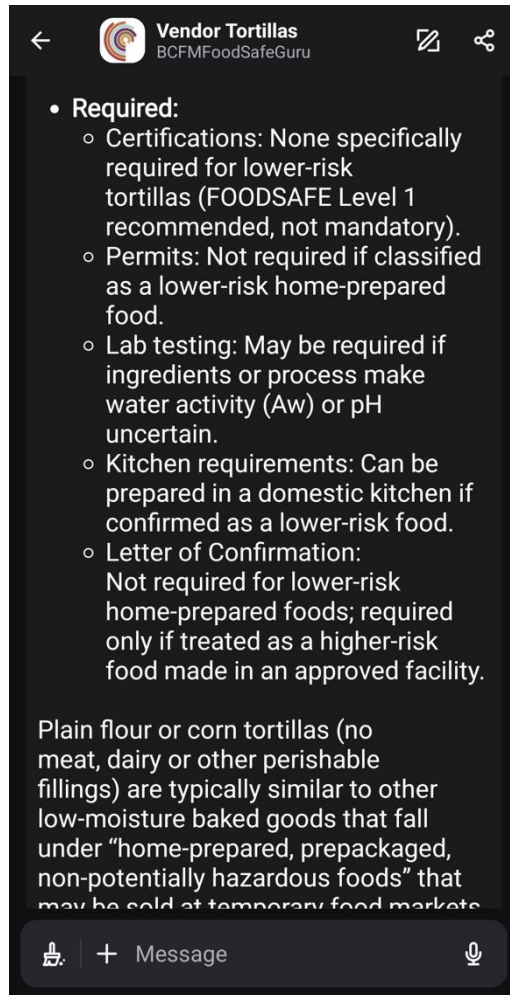
Other Settings: Hot/cold (cold = predictable), public/private, etc.

Vertical AI Top Goal:

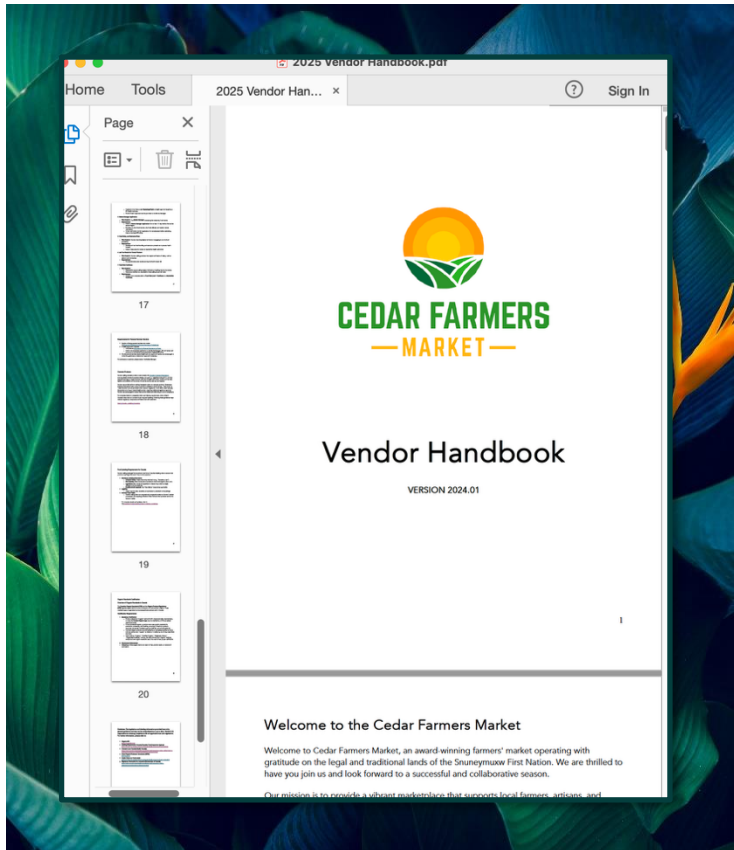
Build a library of your regulatory documents. This can include any documents that are publicly available online.

E.g. Your market's Rules & Regulations, Vendor Handbook, Emergency Procedures, BCCDC, Health Authority, BCAFM, etc.

Build yourself a holy grail SOP manual.

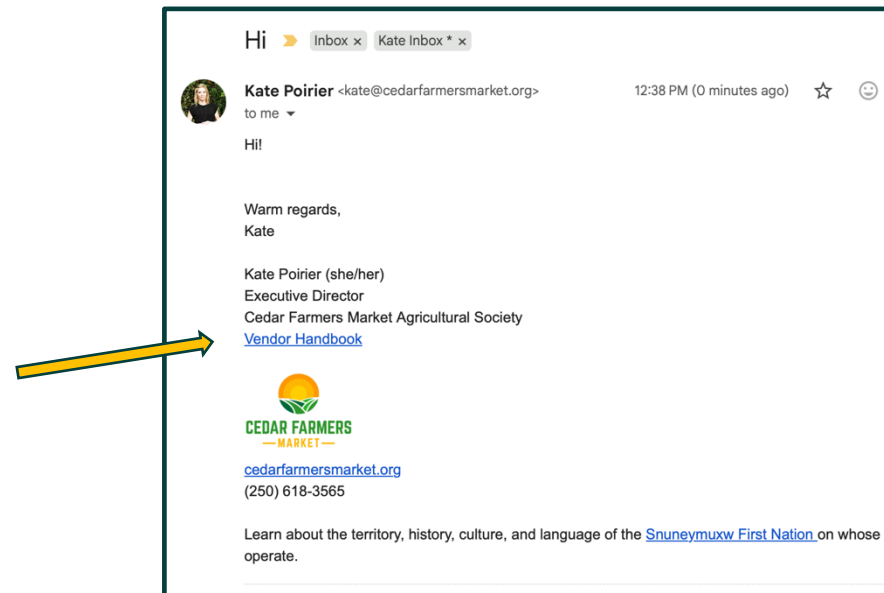
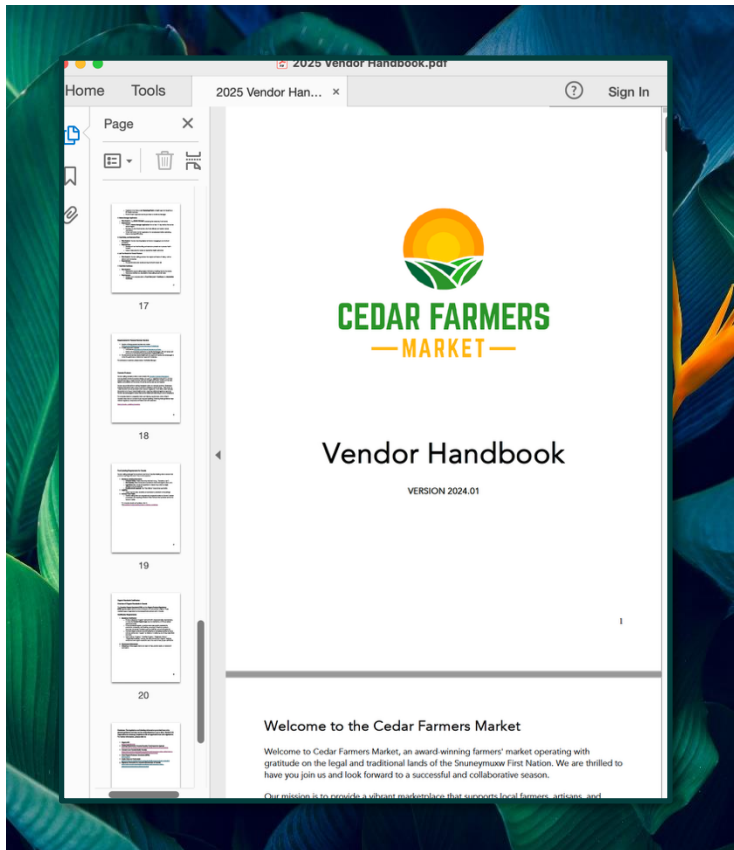
Steps To Build

1. Feed AI a sample handbook for industry-specific reference. (You can use Cedar's if it is helpful.)
2. Describe how your needs are different from the sample.
3. Prompt AI to create a Table of Contents. Spend time editing this section until it is perfect. Copy and paste TOC into Word/Google Docs.
4. Feed more market specific knowledge to bot. Examples:
 - Rules & Regulations and other policy documents from your market and/or BCAFM. (No private docs!)
 - Copy and paste your vendor newsletter.
 - Your website.
 - Any other reference material that your vendors should know.
5. Ask AI to write this chapter by chapter and edit it as you go. The whole handbook at once is probably too much!
6. Make sure you have a market person who can review your work. Review, review, review.

Reduce emails and market day misunderstandings

Estimated time to build: 6 – 40 hours.

Tip: Create a hyperlink in your email signature to your handbook. Have the handbook uploaded to a publicly accessible Google Drive folder.

I wanted to automate my social media and website content, but some of the vendor supplied content was a mess. I didn't have time to rewrite the content application-by-application.

Action: I used Poe.com to build a bot that could rewrite the business descriptions and offered a link directly in my application

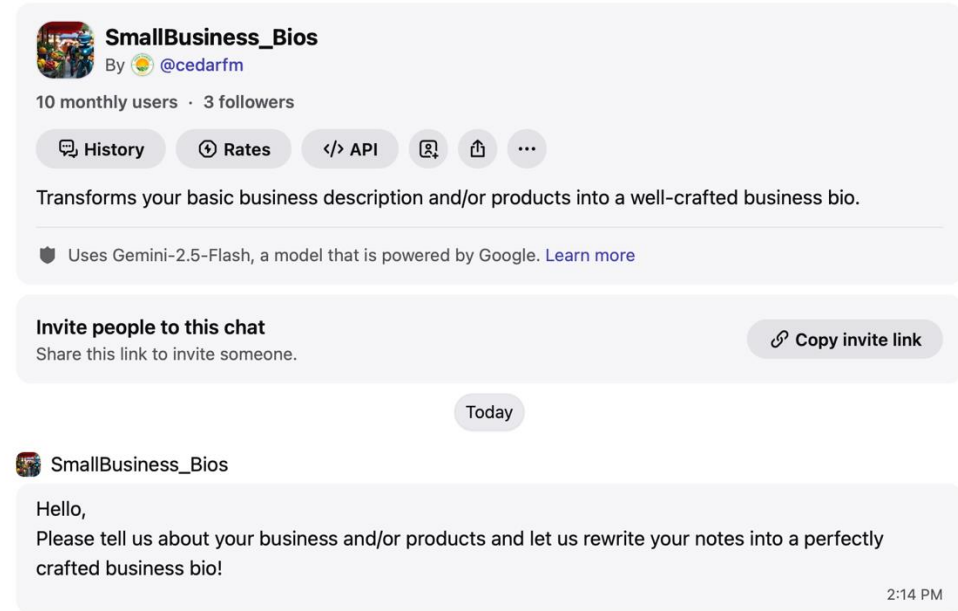

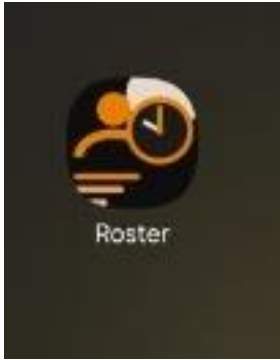

Other Tools That Help Me

These are nice to have, not need to have.



Canva

Go through the work to get free premium version, it is worth it.

Microsoft 365

I have free full Microsoft suite, which I use everyday. However, going through the hoops to get a non-profit free version was painful. 0/10 would not do again, but 10/10 useful.

Excel/Sheets

Learn: Basic formulas, filters, pivot tables. Use ChatGPT for formulas. Describe your data and what you want to do, be specific regarding rows/columns in your sheet, and then paste the formulas. I use pivot tables almost everyday. They are super quick, simple, and helpful once you know how to use them.

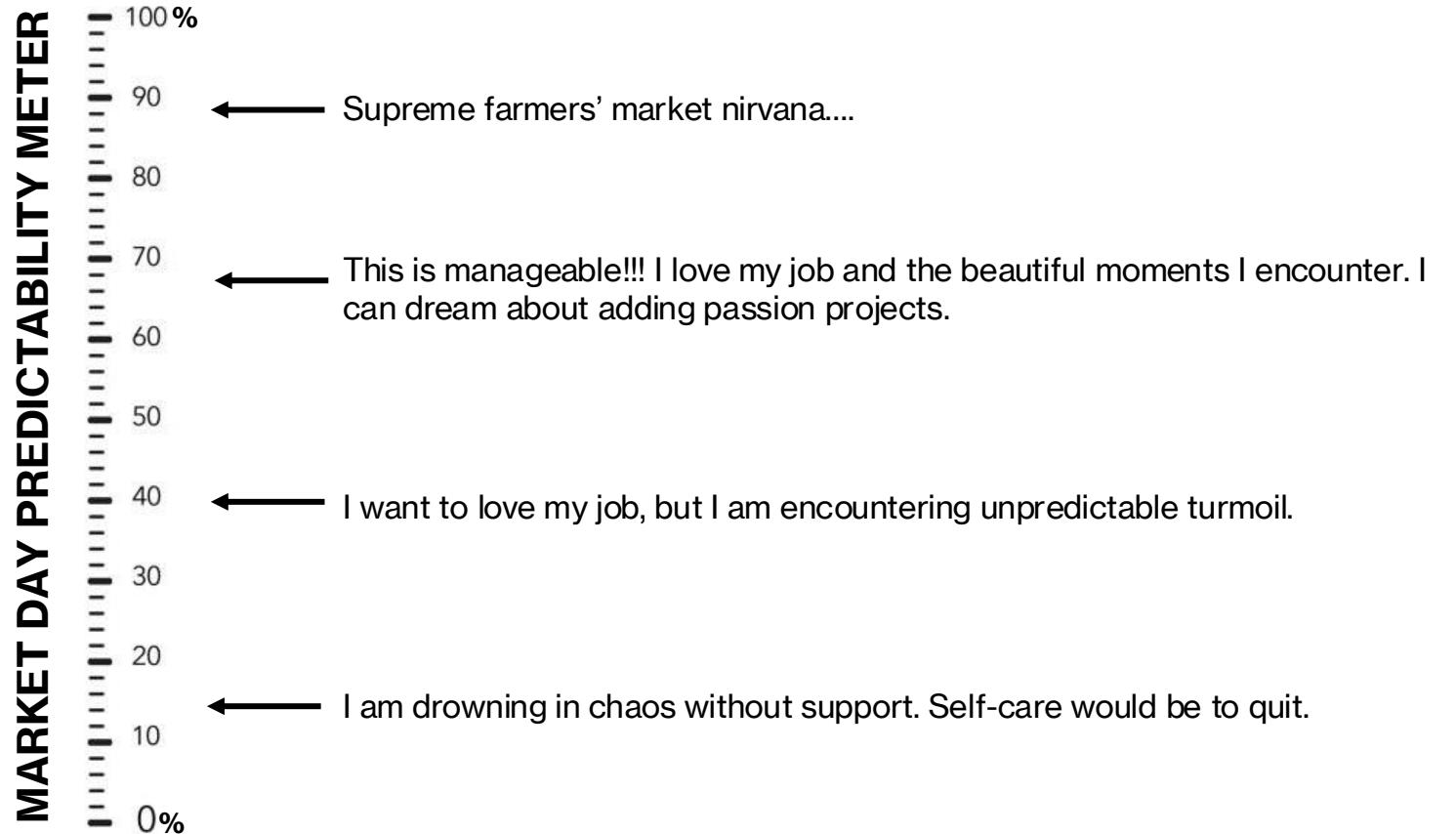
Glideapps.com

If you want to try out vibe coding, the free version of this is great. I also use it to create collages of my vendors to share on socials.



Predictability = Success

The more predictable I can make market day = happy me, happy staff, happy vendors, happy shoppers.





My Top Rules for Managing

- Emotional grievances are dealt with in the office.
- Office issues are not dealt with on market day: stall location (unless health/safety), invoices, payments, anything paperwork/bureaucracy with vendors.
- All payments cutoff before market day. That is confirmation of attendance. E-transfer or Square online only.
- If you want more service than that:
 - We can increase stall fees;
 - We are always looking for volunteers on our board.

In conclusion

Please take a moment to recognize that our work, your work, is complex. You're not bad at your job and you really ARE trying hard enough.

It's also important work. We hold space for small business to start and to be successful. We hold marketspace for local farms to exist and to grow local food, so that our community can eat local foods and pass on that knowledge to the next generation. Food security is national security. And we hold space for our community to gather, and to build relationships.

But we can't do that work if our frontline organizers are lost in the weeds, overburdened, and under-supported. My goal today was to show you that you are not alone, that we can find clarity in our roles, and hopefully, we can make time to really enjoy it.

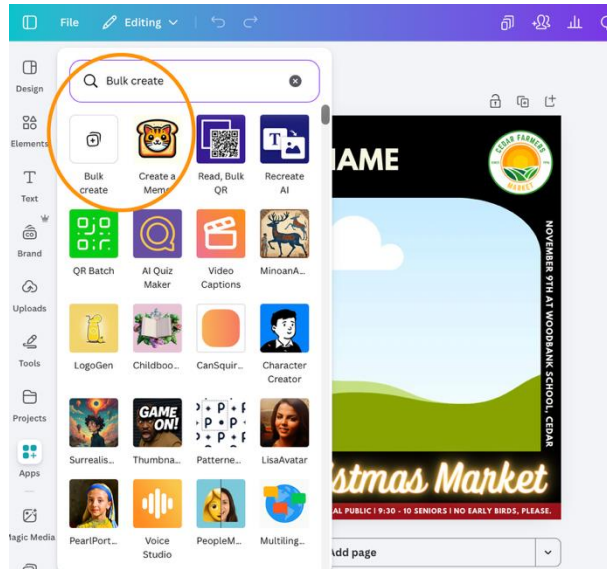
This is a nice-to-have option, not a must-do.

Steps

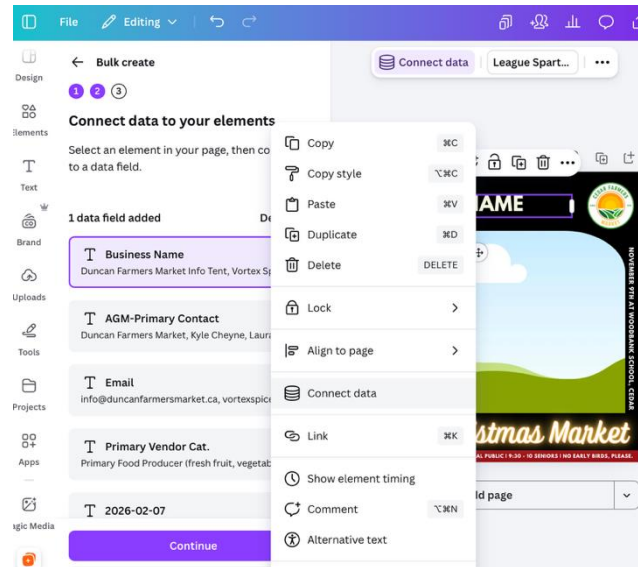
1. Organize your vendors in a spreadsheet
2. Columns: Business name, category, vendor bio, etc.
3. Open Canva and pick a layout ->



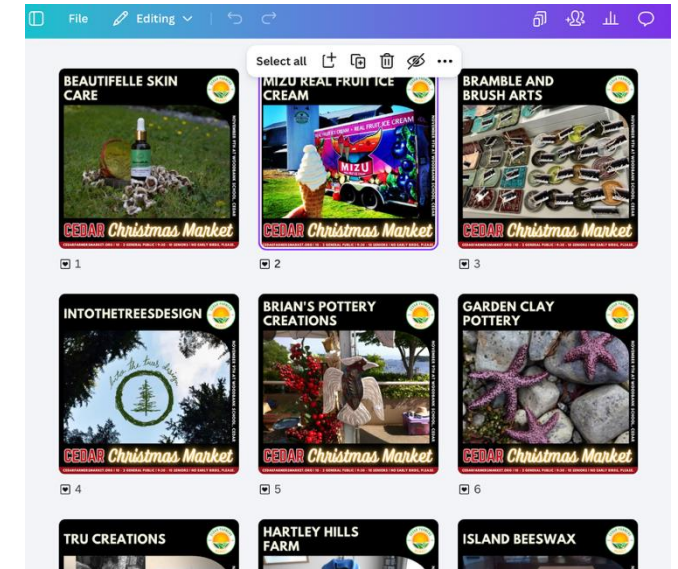

Farmers' Magazine Made Using Bulk Create

Can be turned into a social media post or an ezine/flipbook.

Limitations: Photos are hard to automate with Bulk Create, though you can paste pictures after the frames have all been made. (Much faster than uploading to Canva.)

You can also put all of your images into a Google Folder and connect that folder directly in Canva.
